#### **ARPA and Other Federal Dollars**

- City has received \$2.97 million in **American Rescue Plan Act** (ARPA) funding that will be used for Western Gateway project, ongoing AMI meter project, new Police body and dash cameras, and utility assistance
- Other funding we've received from grants and legislative appropriations is being budgeted for:
  - Safe Routes to School projects
  - New reclaimed water tank
  - Replacing pipe from Well 1 to the High School Water Tank

## **EnerGov – Online Permitting**

- We've officially transitioned to EnerGov, an online permitting platform, for City permits
- 273 permits/plans/inspections have been submitted/scheduled through EnerGov so far
- Guides users step-by-step through the application process
- What can users do with the new permit portal?
  - Manage multiple applications in one place
  - Apply and manage submittals
  - Schedule, view and cancel inspections
  - Submit required documents, view and print approved permits, plans, and other documents
  - Make online payments associated with a submittal



## **Western Gateway**

- Our Western Gateway project officially began construction on August 9
- Major project for us on West Railroad Avenue between 8<sup>th</sup> Street and Pacific Court
  - New pavement
  - Storm drain improvements
  - New water main and water services
  - New curb, gutter, and sidewalks
  - New bus pullout with bus shelter
- Total project budget is \$2.6 million, funded in part by the Transportation Improvement Board (TIB) and the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)
- Ongoing weekly project updates posted on the City's Open Town Hall page

#### **Wastewater Treatment Plant**


- Our hardworking staff at the Wastewater Treatment Plant won the **2021 "Outstanding Plant of the Year"** award from the Department of Ecology
- Second year in a row they have won this award!

#### **WCC Reclaimed Water Project**


- In May, we joined with representatives from Squaxin Island Tribe and Washington Corrections Center to celebrate a new reclaimed water project
- Will enhance flow from Goldsborough Creek and reduce prison usage of the local aquifer by 55,000 gallons a day –
   21 million gallons a year!



#### **Stormwater**

- Achieved compliance with our NPDES
   Phase II permit
- City Council authorized a one year, 20% discount on the stormwater fee for businesses
- Published the Small Project Stormwater
   Management Guide to help small-scale
   developments navigate the Department
   of Ecology's 2019 Stormwater
   Management Manual

- We put together our first Local Road Safety Plan this year
- Generated \$1.1 million from WSDOT to improve the safety of our streets
- Proposed improvements include flashing beacons, street lighting, crosswalk markings, signing, protected left-turn phasing, etc.
- Locations:
  - Olympic Highway North and I Street
  - Olympic Highway South and Bellevue Avenue
  - West Railroad Avenue and 3<sup>rd</sup> Street
  - West Railroad Avenue and 7<sup>th</sup> Street



## **EMS Levy Renewal**

- Approved by voters on the August 2 ballot
- Renewed our EMS levy at the rate of 50 cents or less per thousand dollars of assessed valuation
- Number of EMS calls within Shelton have steadily increased over the past 3 years
- Thankful for our continued partnership with Central Mason Fire & EMS

## **Therapeutic Court**

- Municipal Court, under Judge Greer's leadership, applied for and received a \$199,000 grant from the state Administrative Office of the Courts
- Participants must be at least 18 years old, have a substance use disorder/mental health needs, be charged with an eligible or gross misdemeanor, and be able to receive services in Mason County
- Participants meet weekly with the Therapeutic Court team for a minimum of 9-12 months
- Therapeutic Court is currently held in 5 languages


### **Police**

- We hosted a Coffee With a Cop event at Urraco Coffee, our first since 2018










#### **Homelessness**



- Homelessness Task Force convened by the City in June, this group is comprised of local community members, business owners, service providers, law enforcement, public health officials, and elected officials

- Task Force was charged with developing 6-8
  recommendations focused on short, medium, and
  long-terms which were presented to the community
  at our Spotlight Shelton event on October 11



- Northcliff neighborhood park improvements













## Mason County at a glance

- Strong financial position heading into FY 23
- No County property tax increase in FYs2020, 2021
- Priority remains funding mandated services, law and justice, investing in staff retention and training
- Negotiate and settle CBAs with represented employees (13 total bargaining units). Nonrepresented staff salary study
- Investing in IT to protect sensitive information, ensure continuity of government, and improve customer experience

Increased expenses or economic hardship due to COVID-19 pandemic

Income at or below 80% of Area Median Income (AMI)


# Community Development

- Improve time it takes to receive a building permit
- Increase staffing levels to meet demand and recover from Great Recession (40 -> 20 staff in 2009) including Fire Marshal services
- Implemented LEAN process in 2021-22
- Completed Belfair Environmental Impact Study to streamline process, implemented traffic mitigation fees
- Continue to embrace technology to improve customer experience



## Public Health

- Continue to coordinate response to COVID-19 with partners across the County as needed
- Foundational Public Health funding from state to refocus on chronic disease and prevention
- Emphasis on substance use disorders, behavioral health, homelessness
- Housing Needs Assessment
- Implementing a countywide Clean Water District to merge shellfish protection districts
- Renewed focus on communication and redesigning website to improve accessibility








#### Utilities

- Extending sewer trunk lines in Belfair UGA. 344 single and multifamily units being built and planned
- State Auditor removed audit finding for Belfair sewer – noting our investments to grow customer base, strong fiscal planning
- Major system improvements to Rustlewood and North Bay systems
- Significant volume increase at transfer stations; staffing a major issue

#### Roads

- Maintenance remains top priority, but completed a record number of projects
- Converting gravel roads, widening and paving shoulders to improve safety and access
- Increased emphasis on projects with County forces vs. contracting out
- Secured additional funding for SR 3
   Freight Corridor
